

# **HEART OF THE FRASER:** Tom Berry Property

On September 19, The Nature Trust of British Columbia celebrated the acquisition of the 6.09-hectare (15.05-acre) Tom Berry property near Hope as well as the dedication of a research facility.

"Over the decades of ownership, Buck Berry saw his role as a guardian, for he loved the habitat and its wildlife, the river and its gravel bars, and he wanted them preserved and protected forever. The Nature Trust will ensure his philosophy and vision both come true, to be enjoyed by future generations," declared Robin Wilson, Chair of The Nature Trust.

The Nature Trust is very pleased to be a partner with Pacific Fisheries Resource Conservation Council, North Growth Foundation, BCIT Fish, Wildlife and Recreation Centre of Excellence to create a complex of properties in the Heart of the Fraser Gravel Reach area between Mission and Hope. This latest acquisition joins others along the Fraser including the 22-hectare (54-acre) Harrison Knob which was donated to The Nature Trust by Canfor in 2006. Negotiations are underway regarding other critical properties in this area.

"This part of the river may well be the

most productive stretch of river in the world," said World Rivers Day Founder Mark Angelo.

On the Tom Berry property is a building that will become a research centre used by the BCIT Fish and Wildlife Program and other educational institutions for studying the ecology of this region.

"It is my honour to dedicate this research centre to Wendy Thompson—a young woman who loved the natural splendour of British Columbia," said Doug Walker, CEO of The Nature Trust.

"Wendy was a paramedic with the British Columbia Ambulance Service. She was on a mercy flight to the Queen Charlotte Islands on January 11, 1995 when her aircraft was lost at sea. Wendy's estate has helped fund the acquisition of this property."

# **ROCK CREEK** Donation

Murray LaBrash and Debbie Sharp decided to leave a legacy for the future by donating their land at Rock Creek to The Nature Trust. Located in the Kettle Valley, the 31.9-hectare (78.8-acre) property is on the north side of the Crowsnest Highway 3 between the communities of Rock Creek and Midway. Vegetation includes mixed grasses and scattered Ponderosa Pine with clumps of Douglas fir. Several large wildlife trees, rock outcroppings and small cliffs, and an intermittent stream provide excellent wildlife habitat. This property provides a refuge for wintering ungulates, bears, and other wildlife. The Nature Trust wants to thank Murray and Debbie for their generosity and foresight.



#### How to help

Under Environment Canada's Ecogift program, Canadian landowners may donate ecologically sensitive land to approved conservation organizations such as The Nature Trust of BC to ensure its preservation in perpetuity. To encourage more Canadians to make Ecogifts, the 2006 Federal budget announced that Ecogifts are now 100% exempt from capital gains tax.

# **PROTECTING** the Cowichan River

We want to thank the Flemings for working with The Nature Trust to create a covenant on their property which is situated on the banks of the Cowichan River on Vancouver Island. The Cowichan River is recognized internationally for its highly valuable and productive fish habitat. Species include coho, chinook, and chum salmon and rainbow, brown, and cutthroat trout.

"We were delighted to find that, through a conservation covenant, we could protect forever our beautiful forested property along the Cowichan River, while allowing for continued use by our family. The Nature Trust of BC was a logical choice as covenant holder. They are a British Columbia organization with an impressive record of success in preserving environmentally sensitive areas in our province. On a personal note, in the preparation of their baseline report, Nature Trust staff gave us an even greater appreciation of our property by pointing out to us various biologically significant aspects. The whole exercise was carried out in a very professional manner. It is truly a win-win situation with performance monitored and, if necessary, enforced after annual inspections by The Nature Trust of BC. Have we diminished the market value of the property? Probably not. But, have we left something to celebrate? We think so!"

A conservation covenant is one of the tools that can be used to conserve private land. A conservation covenant is a voluntary legal agreement between a landowner and a designated conservation organization (e.g. The Nature Trust of BC). It is registered on the title to the land and remains in effect after the land is sold or transferred, binding future owners of the land to the terms of the covenant. The agreement ensures that features of the land, areas or uses that you want protected will remain in effect in perpetuity. A conservation covenant allows the landowner to permanently protect specific natural features of the land, while still retaining ownership and use.

# **AWARD** winners

The Nature Trust would like to congratulate Directors Emeritus Dr. Bert Brink and Dr. Ian McTaggart-Cowan as well as Director Carmen Purdy who were recently honoured with awards.

#### Dr. Brink

Dr. Brink was given the 2007 Lieutenant Governor's Award for Conservation for outstanding contributions to wetland conservation and environmental education throughout British Columbia on June 11. As The Honourable Iona Campagnolo, Lieutenant Governor, said upon presenting the award, "I am very grateful to be here on behalf of every British Columbian in thanks for Dr. Brink's steadfast dedication to maintaining the sacred bargain that exists between the human species and all others."

Dr. Brink has been a leader or a participant in forming conservation initiatives that include The Nature Trust of BC, the Habitat Conservation Trust Fund, the Reifel Migratory Bird Sanctuary, the Federation of BC Naturalists and a host of other key conservation organizations.

As early as 1951, as a Professor of Agronomy at the University of British Columbia, Bert Brink, with a PhD in

Botany and Biochemistry, was actively engaged in raising environmental consciousness across this province and country. Today, BC's wetlands owe him a great debt of gratitude.

#### Dr. Ian McTaggart-Cowan

Dr. Ian McTaggart-Cowan is the first recipient of the BC Field Ornithologists Award for Ornithology. He was presented with this award at his home in Victoria on July 8.

Dr. McTaggart-Cowan has dedicated a lifetime to studying, teaching and conserving the natural resources of BC. He graduated from the University of British Columbia in 1932 and earned a PhD from the University of California in 1935. He is a career biologist with special concentration on the systematics, biology and conservation of birds and

mammals. As part of his amazing career, he has spent over 30 years on the board of The Nature Trust.

#### Carmen Purdy

Carmen Purdy was awarded the Roland Michener Conservation Award by the Canadian Wildlife Federation on June 2. The award is presented each year to an individual who has demonstrated commitment to conservation through effective and responsible activities that promote, enhance and further conservation of Canada's natural resources.

"As a professional and a volunteer, Mr. Purdy's contribution to the enhancement and conservation in the Cranbrook area and throughout the province make him a most deserving recipient of the award," said Paul Adams, BC Wildlife Federation Executive Director.

Carmen is very familiar with land management and land use issues in the province as he has served as a Commissioner on the Forest Resources Commission of BC and is currently serving as a Commissioner on the Agricultural Land Commission of BC. He believes that the key to conservation is the management and control of the land base, and has therefore either initiated or participated in a myriad of land acquisition and restoration projects.

He is a past president of the BC Wildlife Federation, past chairman of the BC Conservation Foundation, past president of the East Kootenay Association, and president of the Kootenay Wildlife Heritage Fund.

# **IMPORTANT** Bird Areas

The international Important Bird Area (IBA) Program aims to identify, conserve and monitor essential bird habitats around the world. Over 100 countries participate in the program, through involvement by non-profit, membership-based groups, coordinated by BirdLife International. In Canada 597 IBA sites have been identified and designated as meeting the program's stringent scientific criteria; 84 of the sites are in British Columbia (see www.ibacanada.com for more details of the program and sites).

This year, the BC IBA Program is re-invigorating with a proactive partnership of birders and naturalists around the province, with the purpose of establishing a network of knowledgeable volunteers who are prepared to be Caretakers for each of our IBAs. They will be the "eyes and the ears" on the ground, watching for any changes in bird population levels or conservation threats. It will be the first such Caretaker Network in Canada, although networks of volunteers and site support groups have been established elsewhere in the world, from Denmark to Cambodia, and Tanzania to Mexico.

British Columbia is a large and very biodiverse province with a small human population concentrated in the southwest region. IBAs vary in size and accessibility, and many are remote from communities. Some have severe conservation threats. The challenge is to find Caretakers for every one of the designated IBA sites. We need the help of many conservation organizations, landowners, and concerned individuals to succeed in the protection and monitoring of these critical bird habitat sites. The Nature Trust of BC can be a valuable partner in this program, as a landowner of Important Bird Areas and as a respected leader in the conservation community. Examples of Nature Trust properties and interests with IBA designation include Boundary Bay, Vaseux Lake, White Lake and Cowichan Estuary. Bird monitoring and habitat stewardship within Important Bird Areas contribute to the overall strength of the site network, ensuring the perpetuity of bird populations and



diversity in our province.

The BC IBA Program will unfold over the next few years with several elements: creating the network of volunteer Caretakers, outreach and awareness-raising, and renewal of the database and web-resources. Project coordination is being led by BC Nature (Federation of BC Naturalists) with strong support from Bird Studies Canada BC Regional Office, and from the national IBA partners, Nature Canada and Bird Studies Canada. The Nature Trust has expressed interest in committing to the program, and will be an active partner in the years to come.

The Nature Trust of BC and the Province of BC recently acquired the Tregilges property in the Wigwam Flats area of the Kootenays. This property will add to a complex of conservation holdings which are important for providing habitat for Rocky Mountain sheep.

Phoebe Tolly Tregilges was born at Cakato, BC on May 3, 1921. She was one of 13 children. The Wigwam Flats property was purchased by Phoebe, her sister Mildred and brother Tom when they were teenagers. Phoebe and her siblings raised money to pay for the land during the "hungry thirties" by scavenging the dumps for discarded potato sacks which they repaired by hand and re-sold, collecting and selling scrap metal, berry picking, raising and selling eggs, and any other jobs they could get. As she used to say, "We hung on to the land through thick and thin." Eventually Phoebe bought out her sister's portion of the land (her brother Tom had passed away). The land was later passed to her children. Phoebe's children have partnered with The Nature Trust to create a legacy for their mother.
